Mary Aicheler, from the Holsworthy area, shares how she applied what she learned from the Spiritual Care Series to her own work as an Anna Friend.

Earlier this year I joined the Spiritual Care Series on zoom. During the first couple of sessions there was quite a bit on our own spiritual journey. I had done this before but it was good to think about it again, until it came to considering what your plans for the future were. As I realise that that is more in God's hands, I take one day at a time on most things. I am older than some of the people I minister to so I found I would have to adapt some parts of the course. The time they seemed to imply one would have to spend with each person each week would be virtually full time in one care home if one were to reach the standard they were recommending.

I needed to think it through, adapt it to my situation and gain what I could. In the circumstances I found myself in locally during and just after taking the course I found it stood me in good stead.

At the time I was going into two care homes once a month and had two home visits. In one care home I was just visiting one lady who was nearly deaf and nearly blind but I had taken her Communion for over seven years, first in her own home and then in the care home. In the other care home, Deer Park, I took a Communion service in the lounge for about 10 people and was then asked to visit some of the rooms to give various people a blessing. I only had time to stay a few minutes with each person so there was little time for real meaningful contact. The spirituality course had been about meaningful contact so things had to change.

I could not give more time on any one day; it was just too tiring both physically and emotionally so I arranged to go in on a second day in the month just for room visits. Just before the first visit I got a phone call to say the home was closing in 14 days and all the people were being moved. I agreed with the entertainments officer to go in anyway to see who was still there and where they might be going. Another care home in town seemed to be the place most were going so I got in touch with them as I had been there before but had stopped when their Entertainment Officer left. Yes, they would be happy to see me.

That last day in Deer Park turned out to be something special. I had taken the Communion elements with me just in case and after talking to one or two residents we ended up in the lounge for what was a special service before we went our separate ways.

Going into the new care home was not without its problems. Their Entertainments Officer left after my first interview with her and I was left to just get on with things. Thankfully years in care homes stood me in good stead and we were able to have the service. I had arranged to go in twice a month: once for Communion and once for an Afternoon Prayer service both with hymns, music provided from my laptop. The new entertainments officer turned out to be the one from at Deer Park! We get on well, the visits are lovely and I speak to most of the people individually afterwards. In this home, due to the layout of the building and with far more residents in the later stages of dementia, I do not go into the rooms. Dementia is an area that I am still trying to explore so I can reach out to those people. Most books as well as the course all end during the early stages, leaving a growing number in a lost world. We can pray but we need help so we can do more. Even the course I was on did not cover this difficult area. If you know any that do please contact me. They are still God's children and need his love shown through the people who care for them. (*The editor has Mary's contact details if anyone wants to get in touch.*)

The Spiritual Care Series is an eight-week comprehensive course for those who want to provide good quality spiritual care to older people in their local community. The course equips participants to understand the ageing process, supporting people to reconnect with their past and cope with the losses that ageing brings. It also covers the importance of good listening skills, communication and boundaries in the provision of this care. The course is made available by the Bible Reading Fellowship.
