It has been nearly a year since my wife, four children and I moved into this area. What an incredible year it has been. I have witnessed such generosity, hard work and genuine friendliness in our churches and communities, and it gives me much hope for what lies ahead.

Isaiah, a prophet in the Old Testament, gives a message from God to a broken, war-torn and hopeless remanent of Isreal, saying:



Do not fear, for I have redeemed you: I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume vou. Isaiah 43:1-2

The culture we find ourselves in is often disorientating and overwhelming, like being in a fast-flowing river with no idea where you are heading and little control over whether you will be ok. One Tuesday afternoon some students came into the popup café we run at St James Church, and they told us they had just watched a climate crisis video that effectively declared they would all be dead in twenty years. They were anxious, hopeless, and already thinking their best years were behind them. When we hear these messages what do they do to the way we think, dream, and look out for one another?

I recently heard a therapist on the radio advise the listeners to write down a list of their worries for this new year and then cross out the ones they aren't in control of. Not that they don't exist, just that you have no control over say how Donald Trump will behave. There is usually very little left. We often think we have lots of control over our lives, but it is not the reality. With some self-control, you can influence how you think, behave, and feel by choosing what to eat, watch, exercise, and listen to. But we have little to no influence over most of our worries. Jesus warns us not to worry about the future as it is crippling.

'Therefore, do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.' (Matt 6:34)

I worry. I worry for the future of my children, the church, our elderly, our young, the nature around us, funding for schools and the NHS. But then I find hope as I physically step into community groups like a parish council meeting, a youth concert rehearsal, a local pub hosting carols, churches, school assemblies, care homes, alms-houses, popup café volunteers, and funeral directors. There are too many to mention here.

I have found people again and again who are generously pouring out their time, resources and passions for the people who live around them. They are engaging with the things they can control and are bravely trying to make a difference. When you are acting out of love for your neighbour, giving sacrificially sometimes without thanks, I believe you are engaging in building God's kingdom.

'Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God.' (1 John 4:7)

If you feel overwhelmed, in a river not knowing what is around the next bend, then lean into this message from a God of hope who delights in the goodness found in our communities. 'I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you'.

A very Happy and Peaceful New Year to you from all of us - the Trustees and Friends of our Hall! Now, a 'heartfelt ' thank you to all who supported us through 2024. The events arranged by us were incredibly well supported: the Evening Talk, Quiz, Winter Favre etc. were enjoyed by everyone who came along. During 2024 we have been able to continue with improvements, from a new boiler to the redecorating of the main hall and kitchen. But, time doesn't stand still and we are keen to continue to maintain and continue to improve the facilities for you all to enjoy. Our accounts are in good order, but as you will all know we need to keep a workable balance and sensible reserves. Only a week or so ago, our wall mounted eco water heater failed and needs to be replaced! Thanks to fund raising we should be able to cover this cost. We have been able to source some grants from our Teignbridge and Devon Councillors and thank our own Parish Council for agreeing to support us with a grant to cover half the cost of our Village Hall insurance again his year. The policy is specifically designed for Village Halls so fits our position really well. The regular income from The Bowling Club, Pop Up Café, Pilates and Parish Council are vitally important to us. Sustainable Ideford, Wildlife Wardens and the Church also use the hall for meetings and events. We welcome anyone to use the hall, the rent is reasonable and the facilities excellent. 129/24 | 129.4 Sustainable Ideford (SI): A meeting discussed a joint open gardens event with the Village Hall in early June, focusing on wildlife-friendly gardens. Parish news articles were discussed. There is no progress on street lighting. Car share schemes were suggested in the parish news. Rob Gillett resigned from SI; Cllr. Gardner will manage the handover. Biodiversity on the MG was mentioned; SI offered assistance with MG projects.

> **129.5 Wildlife Wardens:** The biodiversity plan aims to create a database of parish flora and fauna by compiling existing observations and local expertise. A "bio blitz" event was suggested, possibly at the church. The garden bird watch had limited response on Facebook; earlier notification was suggested. Devon Wildlife Trust will host a tree hub in the village in January/February (dates pending).

130/24 PLANNING:

130.1 24/01735/HOU - Homefield , Ideford, Chudleigh, Erection of two storev side extension The owners had invited the council to have a look. A discussion over elements of the application took place and all councillors are in support of this application.

- 130.2 There were no new planning decisions
- 130.3 Planning Appeal 24/00057/REF Appeal against the refusal of 23/02168/FUL Retention of driveway entrance, piers and gate Further to the previous comments submitted there is nothing to add.

There was some confusion as the Appeal documents appeared to contradict the September PC agenda / minutes, which had noted that '24/01361/CLDP Homefield, Ideford - The proposed new gate, piers and flanking walls are permitted development'. It was suggested that as significant steps were proposed to reduce the height of the walls, following the Council's earlier neutral comments the Council should now submit a comment supporting the Appeal. As some biodiversity damage had been caused by the retrospective application, this was rejected by five votes to one in favour of submitting a comment simply noting the Appeal 130.3 Enforcement update: Cllr Carter-Woodwark indicated there was nothing to report

131/24 CONCERNED RAISED BY PARISHIONERS TO COUNCILLORS

On Haldon Lane, the chair was met by off road scrambling bikes, he mentioned this is not a byway and they left. Cllr Batting the hedgerow from Longthorne to the top of Church Road is overgrown. Haldon Lane has been trimmed. The byway area, Hamblecombe Lane was trimmed by private contractors, did the whole lane

132/24 CLERK'S REPORT AND FINANCE:

- 132.1 Budget proposal
- 132.2 Balance of accounts £15,530.09. (end of November) and the bank reconciliation for November 2024 was approved.
- 132.3 Approval for payments made since last meeting -Scribe accounts 132.4 Budget - regarding the grants and insurance. The grant to MG is now

irrelevant as in the insurance. A grant for the hall £500 had been mentioned and everyone was in agreement.

Our Village School / Hall

In 1836, £65 was taken from the village "Coal Fund" to convert the Church Poor House into a school for the village children and house for the teacher. (This house still stands – it is Glebe Cottage in Fore Street.)

The "School District Act" of 1850 provided for free education for children from poor families, so a larger premises was required and James Templar of Lindridge granted land measuring 33ft by 33ft on Church Street under the 1856 School Sites Act. Local subscription (names like Lord Clifford, Cornish and Vooght appear on the list) raised the money to build and run the school. The school continued for over a century, Ideford children being joined by those from Luton in the 1920's when their school closed. Over this time the trusteeship of the school had evolved to the Diocesan Board of Finance, (Under British law the Church of England has a responsibility to raise as much money as possible from the sale of any redundant property it owns.)

In 1973 the village was informed that their school was to close and the children bussed to the brand new school about to open in Bishopsteignton. The Rector at the time, Rev Fred Rawson immediately began a campaign to save the school building for the use of the village and not have it sold for housing on the open market despite the Local Council seeking planning permission for a "residential property". The school closed in July 1973 with over thirty children on the register. The campaign began in earnest! The Village Hall Committee was formed with the Rector and ten villagers including names still represented in the village today like Mrs Stevens and Mrs Vivian.

"Lord Clifford brought the matter of school closure to the House of Lords with a Bill to the effect that present trustees of endowed schools should, on closure, offer them to the local community for sale or to let, having regard to the contributions made already by the community to their building." The Committee stage of the Bill passed in July 1974 and the third reading completed in January 1975. In the gallery of the House of Lords was Rev Fred Rawson, he had been released from hospital in London to attend the hearing. Fred died on Easter Monday, 31st March just two months later.

Meanwhile the Committee was busy raising £10,000 through flower festivals, carnival floats etc. in addition to sourcing grants. They even appeared on BBC Nationwide. In June 1977 Lord Clifford opened the newly named Fred Rawson Hall as part of the Queen's Silver Jubilee celebrations.

As we celebrate 50 years since that Bill in the House of Lords enabled us to acquire our much loved village hall, we still need committee members and we still need fund raising.

Ideford School as reported by Pam Rein

(Daughter of Gladys Stevens who lived at Broadlands)

I attended Ideford School from September 1956 until I was 11 vears old.

The school was divided into two classes by a folding partition. Coming in from the front door was the Junior class.



The Infants' class was through a door in the partition.

A door went from the Juniors into the cloak rooms and from there a door went outside and then up steps to the playground. The toilets were in the back left hand corner of the playground.

There was a black stove in the Junior room which was the heating for the whole school. Milk was delivered daily, one small bottle per child. Often frozen in winter.

Most children went home for dinner but for the very few that didn't, meals were delivered in metal canteen trays that kept the food hot.

We had desks with lids, and ink pots in the top.

At the back of the class we had two tanks, one with fresh water creatures, usually tadpoles in the spring and one with salt water for sea creatures like anemones and starfish.

Mrs Ansell was the Infant school teacher and Miss Bisco took the Junior class. In the Junior school we had nature walks once a week around the village. On Friday we were given spellings to learn over the weekend and tested on Monday. Also on Friday we had to choose a poem to learn and recite off by heart on Monday. Sometimes we had a film show, usually nature related, that was shown in the cloakroom as that was the only dark room. Miss Bisco had a whippet dog that came to school with her and she would regularly fill her car up with the dog and as many children as she could fit in and take us up on to Dartmoor or rock pooling at Shaldon.

The school day would start with all the children having to gargle with salt water. Then we had to do the weather forecast and record all our findings. We had a map of the world painted on the play ground. We learnt country dancing.

125/24 MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING: Minutes of the meeting held on Thursday 14 th November 2024 will be viewed, approved and signed at the next meeting when they are available.

126/24 DECLARATION OF INTERESTS: Cllr. T. Hill in relation to the Insurance matter and the Millennium Green, Cllr. Carter-Woodwark declared an interest as a Ideford Hall Trustee

127/24 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION: None

128/24 REPORTS:

> 128.1 Cllr. Peart (Climate Change/Environment): Various organisations are hosting woodland events during National Tree Week and winter (details on the National Tree Week website and partners' social media). The Emergency Tree Fund (ETF), concluding in December, it has funded 40,000 trees and supported the Devon Tree and Woodland Strategy. The ETF piloted carbon offsetting and engaged 1,000+ volunteers. While free trees are currently oversubscribed, communities planning for next year should contact the Woodland Trust and/or Devon Wildlife Trust. Devon's canopy cover is 14.7% but aims to reach 16.5% by 2050. Funding will enable planting of 27,000 more trees by next March, bringing the DCC total since 2019 to 77,000. In response to Cllr. Gardner's question, Cllr. Peart confirmed the parish council's role as consultee regarding planning reforms and biodiversity. The district has 300 defibrillators remaining; online CPR training was mentioned.

> 128.2 Cllr. Gearon (District Councillor): Only one full council meeting has taken place. No significant updates for the parish council.

128.3 Neighbourhood Beat Manager: No crime statistics for October.

129/24

PARISH MATTERS:

129.1 Insurance: The council combined its insurance with the Millennium Green's (MG) via AJ Gallagher's, resulting in a £580 cost reduction. Public, employer's, and trustee liability are covered. The MG has a committee and trustees operating under its deed. Cllr. Carter-Woodwark noted the Village Hall's separate insurance arrangements. Questions about liability were raised, and the chair suggested consulting the broker. Cllr. C. Hill clarified that trustees, not insurance, determine liability. Concerns about governance of outdoor equipment were raised, and the chair noted the need for a policy review. The council agreed to the cost reduction and requested a mechanism for clarifying policy aspects. Cllr. Gardner questioned the impact of the completed building on the joint policy and MG asset maintenance. The chair stated additional insurance will be considered post building completion. The council agreed MG should report planned changes affecting insurance to the PC quarterly.

129.2 Snow Warden: Julian Hull is the current snow warden, but his continuation is unconfirmed. Anthony French and Cllr. T. Hill are deputy wardens. The council will confirm Rob Coombes's availability and explore potential overlap with Will Vooght.

129.3 Roadworks/Highways/Parking/Potholes: Buts Lane requires resurfacing. The chair requested pothole reports with photographs. Cllr. Gardner will report the issue with photographs.

120/24 cont.

The village previously had a skip funded by TDC. This was looked into but the requirements are overbearing at £2000.00 for a skip and employing someone full time to stay with it. There is a free to access recycling facility in Brunel Road, Newton Abbott. Mention was made of using licensed waste businesses, who may be able to assist if anyone needs this, but charges would be applicable.

121/24

CLERK'S REPORT AND FINANCE:

121.1 Budget proposal the amount was set and the Cil received and noted from TDC.

121.2 The balance of accounts £16169.74 was provided to the end of October and approval of the monthly bank reconciliation for October 2024 was given.

Ideford Sustainability Group - U is for UPCYCLING

Upcycling benefits the environment by reducing the pollutants of air, land and water when new goods are manufactured as well as preventing additional natural resources from being used. It also reduces the amount of excess waste which would otherwise end up in landfills.

When we put out recycling for collection, we like to believe those old items are remade into new items and get cycled over and over again. In reality, most recycling is really 'downcycling'. In practice, not all recycling is created equal. Most materials become less and less useful the more they are recycled, and so don't necessarily replace virgin raw materials.

Upcycling generally means simply turning a low-value product into a highvalue product. Upcycling might not require expensive breaking down of an old product in to constituent materials. Such as when old bike tyres are made into new belts, old shopping bags converted to notebooks or broken bicycles and motorbikes can be remade into lamps and furniture for example.

Plastic waste from rivers and the sea can be made into items such as office furniture. The furniture (and the recycled plastic) is then worth a premium, because its history is something we care about. This bypasses economic challenges to some extent, by enabling us to channel our desire for recycling into our purchasing decisions. However, upcycled products tend to be labour intensive and therefore expensive.

Any kind of recycling helps keep materials in use and this can potentially reduce demand for some materials. Even downcycling paper and plastic into new products means that those new products don't have to be created from virgin paper and plastic, and this obviously comes with environmental benefits.

Upcycling empty wine bottles into designer glassware or reusing jam jars (which we excel at in Ideford!) diverts these containers from going to waste and, what's more, the energy that was used to create the original glass bottles or jars has been preserved as well as the raw materials which were used to create them.

For complex products such as electronics, not all useful metals are recovered in the recycling process. By extending the life of electronic items through reuse and remanufacturing, these valuable materials are able to stay in circulation.

113/24	WELCOME AND APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE: The Vice-Chair opened the meeting at 7:00pm and welcomed everyone. Apologies were received from Cllr T Hill - Chair, Cllr R Peart, District County Cllr; Robin Aaronson, Wildlife Warden; and Cllr Gearon - District Cllr.
114/24	MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING: The minutes of the meeting on 10th October 2024 were agreed as a true and accurate record
115/24	DECLARATION OF INTERESTS: Cllr. Carter-Woodwark declared a potential interest in the budget discussion with her role as a Village Hall Trustee.
116/24	PUBLIC PARTICIPATION: None
117/24	REPORTS: There were no reports from Councillors and no crimes reported to the PCSO
118/24	PARISH MATTERS: 118.1 Updates on roadworks, highways, parking issues and potholes. The difficulties caused by pot holes in Butts Lane were raised and it was confirmed that the repairs of these are on Devon Highway's list. Work repairing the potholes in Olchard Lane had been completed and the Lane was scheduled to be resurfaced next year.
	118.2 Sustainable Ideford . It was agreed to discuss SI as part of the budget agenda item. 118.3 Update from the Wildlife Wardens . £100 worth of bulbs and a donation of 5 crab apple trees by Rob Gillett had been planted as part of the wilding initiative in the graveyard. The church hedgerow had been planted with saplings and fenced off for protection. 200 saplings had been planted in Higher Colleybrook. Spare oak saplings were available to any member of the village.
	118.4 Budget discussion. The clerk indicated there was an overspend in 23-24; but for 24-25 the Council were on target with a small underspend. Increases in certain costs would mean that next year's budget would need to rise. This included the cost of insurance. Due to new regulations the cost of some items (including assets, election costs etc) should be spread over 4 years; and there is a requirement that a years worth of spending needs to be kept in the reserves.

118/24 cont.

Inflation this year was mentioned and the reserves were not as high as indicated due to a grant of £2000 to the MG for the new building (yet to be paid). VAT reclaim and CIL would offset some costs. Given the projected budget requirements for 25-26, Councillors felt a 2% increase in the precept to cover this would be manageable and reasonable and should be used for budget purposes and be agreed at a later date.

Future projects i.e. With the Millennium Green (MG) and the Wildlife Wardens (WW) might need some funding as these projects are also in the biodiversity plan. Mr. Morby added that any MG project has to be resident led, then ideally matched with a grant, which if unused goes back to the reserves. There will need to be a governance question on how to manage a project on the MG. The Woodland Trusts provide the trees and some materials have come from Devon Wildlife Trust.

SI Sustainable Ideford - the budget has been spent on key events including carbon awareness, and a wildlife garden event etc. The biodiversity plan was adopted and the WW are part of the work in the plan. The 23-24 budget for SI had been higher than that in 24-25 and due to the lower budget, some meetings in 24-25 had been in private homes rather than the hall. A suggestion to return the budget to the earlier level of £500 was met with support from councillors to go forward to the next meeting. Going forward SI would need hall hire for future events, and spending on marketing to promote the events.

Village Hall, Cllr. Carter-Woodwark said that it had been suggested the village hall may also want to amalgamate their insurance with the PC, as the MG had done. While this might further reduce overall insurance costs, the village hall committee had discussed this, including in respect to some of the insurance provisions that were specific to the hall, and outlined a series of questions that a shared policy raised, which included liability and coverage. The village hall committee felt it would be best to keep the insurances separate. Concerns were raised after the discussion and the parish council would like to invite the millennium green to the next meeting to discuss matters.

Policy updates: The clerk explained various policies are not up to date and changes are needed. Some policies have not been reviewed at all. It was decided to do the filming and recording policy in December along with the risk assessment and then another in February next year 2025. Ideford is using standing orders from Nalc without any alterations, which will also require a review.

119/24 | PLANNING:
